
Mrs Wolsheimer will be coming as the new Dutch mother-tongue teacher for children in both Moshi and Arusha.

ISM Rhino Support

You may remember that last term S1 joined "Save the Rhino International" for a few kilometres of their walk from Mombasa to Uhuru Peak in aid of rhino conservation. As a result of their involvement ISM gained an invitation to visit Mkomazi Game Reserve and learn about the efforts being made to conserve the Black Rhino.



The Mkomazi Project aims to protect and restore the badly degraded ecosystem which, together with the adjoining Tsavo National Park in

Kenya forms one of the largest continuous tracts of protected wilderness in East Africa. e Project includes the establishment of a sanctuary for the Black Rhino and the implementation of a captive breeding programme for wild dogs. Both species are in grave danger of extinction and the plan is to reintroduce them to their former habitats.

One quiet weekend at the end of May a lorry-load of ISM students invaded the camp of Tony


Fitzjohn, Field Director of the George Adamson Trust and Mkomazi Project. We received a warm welcome and were shown to a lovely shaded campsite which made a change from the usual bare spot in the dust. We enjoyed a game drive to the boundaries of the sanctuary and then on to the Kenyan border, a walk through the bush and along the airstrip (both accompanied by very helpful guides), an evening wildlife video at the campsite, a tour of the camp and wild dog pens and an informative talk from Tony. Future opportunities for field-work and outdoor pursuits are endless.

We decided to help the project by raising money to buy cement for a dam which must be built in order to supply the rhino sanctuary with water. The students have responded very well and have worked hard to raise money in various ways,

selling cakes, pizza, ice cream, fruit cream, "roses for rhinos" and T-shirts and through discos and a fashion show. I would like to congratulate the students for the initiative and commitment they have shown.

However we have a long way to go to reach our target (400 bags - half of the cement that is needed) and we hope to get the support of parents, friends and relatives in raising the rest.

So, parents, during this long holiday please encourage your son or daughter to appeal to friends and relatives back home for small donations: a bag of cement costs about \$8. A few bags per student and the future of this beautiful animal in one corner of Africa will be assured and the project can go forward. Money can be paid into the rhino account of the school bank by students or via the accounts office.



Humankind has recklessly brought about the extinction of many living things on this planet. We are the guardians of what is left. Please help us to "save the Rhino" for our children's sake.

On the agenda will be some changes to the PTA's constitution and the election of the new PTA Executive Committee. Be there and make your feelings and opinions heard.

IB Orientation (21st-23rd August)

The first three full days of term will consist of a special orientation programme for the IB1 students. This includes an introduction to the course, an overview of the CAS programme and guidance on a number of techniques of value to IB students such as essay writing. The students will make new friends and learn to work as a group as they also do two sessions of community service together. This orientation is extremely important and parents are asked to ensure that students arrive to start IB on the first day of school

There will also be an IB1 residential weekend work camp based on Careers, Life Skills and Theory of Knowledge from Friday, 6th October to Sunday, 8th October.

S1 & S2 Orientation (21st August)

There will be a special programme on the first day of term to explain to students new in secondary how the secondary school operates and to introduce them to some of the ways in which they can achieve success in secondary and how to get help when they need it. All S1 and S2 students will need to attend this essential orientation.

Going to America?

Any student who may wish to consider further education in the USA or Canada will be required to take a TOEFL (Test of English as a Foreign Language) and/or SAT (Scholastic Achievement Tests). These tests are held at ISM and are usually taken by IB1 students in May and then again by IB2 students in November/December, although they may be taken by any students on the available dates. Payment for these tests (for ISM students only) may be made through the school office. Students should see the IB

Coordinator well in advance of registration deadlines to obtain advice and practice materials. Test dates for 95/96 are:

SAT I and II November 4th 1995
TOEFL November 18th 1995
SAT I and II December 2nd 1995
SAT I and II May 4th 1996
TOEFL May 11th 1996

The New Secondary School Structure

As many parents will know we are changing the structure of the school from a 7 + 4 (Primary + Secondary) to a 6 + 5 structure. Your child's class name may therefore change, but his/her programme of studies will continue smoothly from this year to next. The chart below explains the name changes:

Thus a student in P6 in 1994/95 will be in S1 in August; a student in P7 now will be in S2 in August 1995; and a student in S1 now will move to S3 in August. IGCSE examinations will now be taken at the end of the S5 year. The International Baccalaureate programme remains two years in length.

Is the Lunch Break too short?

Sports News

It has been a relatively quiet term for sports with many of the outdoor facilities unusable for much of the term due to the heavy rains. However, there was an addition to our facilities with the opening of the **climbing wall** on the east wall of Karibu Hall. Preparations are underway for next term already. The main focus will be swimming which has increased in popularity recently. For the secondary students there will be the chance to compete in Kenva **Swimming** Championships in November the first time the school has had this opportunity. For the primary and lower secondary students, ISM will be hosting an Inter-Schools Swimming Gala which will involve teams from IST in Dar, Morogoro International School, ISM Arusha Branch and hopefully a school from Kenya.

Congratulations to **Mawenzi** house who are this year's inter-house competition champions. Within the two age categories, **Mawenzi** were also the junior champions, and **Kibo** were the senior champions.

As with the sports, this has been a relatively quiet term due to both examinations and the rains, but we still had two excellent trips.

Outdoor Pursuits

Kifinika Crater: twelve students and four staff stayed for two nights at Mandara Hut on Kilimanjaro and enjoyed a day's walk to Kifinika. "We expected to get very wet, but the rain kindly stayed away except on our visit to the crater where we were obliged to turn around and leave only a few minutes after we arrived."

Little Meru: twelve students and four staff took the steep route up and the shady route down with two nights at Miriakariba Hut. Highlights: our favourite guide, magnificent views, cordon bleu macaroni, angelic singing, sparkling waterfalls and no angry buffalo.

thanks to many people and the hard labour day things were cleaned out. Things were well until 27th April when it rained again for long but not as hard as before. This made it seem as though the work which we had already done was in vain. So our class of S3 with Sandra went to the tennis courts to measure the depth and mass of mud on the tennis courts.
